

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### **1. KNOWING THE DESTINATION**







Any journey or endeavour that we might undertake requires that we have a clear outcome or destination. Without a destination, there's no reason. What do you think? What is the ultimate purpose for life?



Above everything, the certain hope of all creation declaring the praises of the exalted Lord Jesus is ultimate reality.

Pray that the glory of Jesus would be ever present in your mind this year as you strive to work and share the good news about Jesus at work.



## SHARING JESUS POST-COVID 2. WHAT THE WORLD NEEDS NOW







There are many theories about what's wrong with the world and what the world needs – education, equality, echinacea... (ok so maybe not that last one). What do your friends and colleagues think the world needs?



Without Jesus, our world is dead in sin, following the ways of the devil, captive to our evil cravings, deserving of God's wrath. Our world needs Jesus.



As for you, you were dead in your transgressions and sins, <sup>2</sup> in which you used to live when you followed the ways of this world and of the ruler of the kingdom of the air, the spirit who is now at work in those who are disobedient. Åll of us also lived among them at one time, gratifying the cravings of our flesh and following its desires and thoughts. Like the rest, we were by nature deserving of wrath. But<sup>4</sup>because of his great love for us, God, who is rich in mercy, m<sup>5</sup>ade us alive with Christ even when we were dead in transgressions—it is by grace you have been saved. <sup>6</sup> And God raised us up with Christ and seated us with him in the heavenly realms in Christ Jesus, <sup>7</sup> in order that in the coming ages he might show the incomparable riches of his grace, expressed in his kindness to us in Christ Jesus.



# SHARING JESUS POST-COVID **3. RIGHT PLACE, RIGHT TIME**







"Life is what happens to you when you're busy making other plans." John Lennon. So often our attention is drawn to the next thing, our future; or else we dwell on the past. It can be difficult to notice what is happening right now.

How often do you pause to reflect on why you're in the role you're currently in?



God has put us in the exact time and place we're in so that people might find him through us.



"The God who made the world and everything in it is the Lord of heaven and earth and does not live in temples built by human hands. <sup>25</sup>And he is not served by human hands, as if he needed anything. Rather, he himself gives everyone life and breath and everything else. <sup>26</sup> From one man he made all the nations, that they should inhabit the whole earth; and he marked out their appointed times in history and the boundaries of their lands. <sup>27</sup> God did this so that they would seek him and perhaps reach out for him and find him, though he is not far from any one of us.<sup>28</sup> 'For in him we live and move and have our being.' # **Key Truths**

- 1. God doesn't fit into our little temples, nor does he squeeze into our little plans. We fit within his grand schemes for all of history.
- 2. God has set out our exact times and places so that we might seek him, reach out and find
- him (though he's not far from any of us). This must also include when and where we work.
- 3. If God has set the places and times unbelievers work so they might find him, it follows that he has also set the times and places Christians work so that through us people might find him.
- 4. It is no accident that we are working with the people we are, it is part of God's plan to see

unbelievers come to know Jesus.


God didn't sit through COVID, hands tied, not knowing what to do. God is still in

What are your thoughts?



God is the one who ultimately changes hearts and minds so we need to ask him to give people new spiritual life. Prayer is central to our workplace witness.

What do you think keeps us from praying for our colleagues?

We pray because nothing happens in mission – in the workplace or overseas – unless God acts to build his kingdom.

Often we think our lack of progress in sharing Jesus or our colleagues' sluggish response

to Jesus is because we just haven't found the right argument, or read the right book, or

watched the right video. Could it be our lack of prayer?



### 5. THIS IS HOW WE DO IT (COFFEE/DINNER/GOSPEL)







There's a saying among Christian missionaries: *Closed country, open hearts; open country, closed hearts.* Do you think this is true for Australia?



Our society is structured against going deeper and asking the bigger questions - to do so requires relational engagement - or Coffee, Dinner, Gospel.



Have you noticed that people like to compartmentalise their lives?

We talk about work/life balances, as if life doesn't really happen at work. Why is that?

In Australia we tend to see the world in two very separate realms;

Public, observable, secular realm


Private, sacred realm


Our culture has learned that conversations on religion tend to lead to fights and so we avoid them in public arenas to keep the peace.

So how can we talk to people about Jesus?

5. THIS IS HOW WE DO IT (COFFEE, DINNER, GOSPEL)







The deeper we go in relationships, the deeper we are willing - it's all a matter of trust. Let's look at how conversations work in our culture according to Coffee, Dinner, Gospel: **COFFEE** - Coffee is public and safe. It lasts minutes and conversation is usually restricted to

small talk - weather, sport, news. If things get too deep, you can alwasy make a quick escape.

**DINNER** - Dinner is more private, Once small talk is exhausted we become open to more private issues - personal values, worldviews, politics, and religion. Once we move into the private realm we need to listen well; asking questions like, 'Do you have faith? Do you pray? What values do you want your kids to have? How did you come to believe that?' (notice the factual way of asking a private question) **GOSPEL** - The gospel touches who we are at our most central part, and so it usually takes

some time for us to get to this stage with people.

5. THIS IS HOW WE DO IT (COFFEE, DINNER, GOSPEL)



Sharing Jesus takes going deeper in relationships. Our culture resists speaking about

the matters of the gospel of Jesus until we've built relational trust.

But also, sharing Jesus takes confidence.... in God.

Daniel prays "He reveals deep and hidden things; he knows what lies in darkness, and

light dwells with him." (Daniel 2:22). God knows the private thoughts of our colleagues -

better than we do!

We can trust God as we seek to draw people out. God knows their hearts and is an

expert at drawing the hidden things to light.

### How about in a post-COVID world?

COVID did bring some changes to our conversation. People grew quickly tired

of small talk and were more interested in talking about deeper things - but at

the same time they did so by dropping off the superficial relationships. Now,

we seem to be returning to pre-COVID attitudes - we're just not practiced at

small talk anymore. Time to get practicing!



Pray for the people in your workplace, pray for deepening relationships with colleagues for the sake of the gospel of Jesus.

Think of the friendships you have had. How did those relationships start?



Jesus tells us to make friends by using money that will fail for the sake of the kingdom that will never fail.

# **Key Truths**

- 1. These verses follow the parable of the shrewd manager an odd parable, but it is
- essentially a contrast between how God's people and the people of this world live.
- 2. The master praises the dishonest manager for his shrewd actions and Jesus remarks that
  - the people of this world are more shrewd than the people of light. The word here for
  - shrewd describes practical wisdom of the one having life experience.
- 3. Jesus' insight here is to use worldly wealth to gain friends for yourself. (Interestingly, Proverbs 19:4,6 seem to support his point)
- 4. Jesus' point is wealth won't last. Markets fall, consumer confidence crumbles, but God's
  - kingdom never fails. Wealth isn't for keeping it's to use to make friends for the sake of the kingdom.
- 5. One reason to make friends with worldly wealth is so they too would be welcomed into heavenly dwellings.

When it comes to working, what does it mean to be a wise steward of our money?

Work from home to save on commuting costs? Bringing in your lunch rather than buying

out? Using the office coffee machine rather than going to the coffee shop?

What might it look like to use worldly wealth to make friends in the post-Covid workplace?

Making friends requires an intentional desire to love others. But also, making friends costs time, money, and energy – especially in the post-Covid workplace. Making friends means spending time with people, getting to know them in a deeper way. Generally speaking, this doesn't happen well in an office while trying to get work

done - but rather in the incidental times: coffee breaks, lunches, work trips, outside

work functions. Many workers have reported that since Covid they just spend less time

with other colleagues – or with those colleagues that we spent time with pre-Covid.

Making friends might mean going out for lunch or coffee regularly with colleagues – and

budgeting for it as a mission expense. Making friends might mean staying out when you

feel exhausted on a Thursday or Friday evening to spend time with colleagues. Making

friends might mean initiating social events that dried up since Covid.

What are some ways you have seen people successfully develop friendships at work?

Next week, we'll spend some more time thinking of the practical ways forward for developing relationships in the post-Covid workplace. (It's a longer one - you may like to read it before you come to EPT)




### How about in a post-COVID world?

7. MAKING FRIENDS POST-COVID







Have you ever been to a wedding or a party when someone asks "So how did you meet?" or "How do you know the bride?" The answer always seems to fall flat – "Oh we went to school together" or "We used to work at the same place" or "we had a mutual friend". It never describes how the relationship developed accurately.

Friendships are mystical phenomena, it's hard to pinpoint how they develop. This week we're going to spend some time reflecting on how we can develop relationships in the post-COVID workplace.



Developing relationships in the post-Covid workplace is more complex and difficult than before – but is also potentially more fruitful than ever.



One who has unreliable friends soon comes to ruin, but there is a friend who sticks closer than a brother.

7. MAKING FRIENDS POST-COVID

# **Key Truths**

Sharing Jesus in the post-COVID workplace has become harder, there's no escaping it. However, there some of the more important aspects remain the same. God is still the one who does the work of change in our colleagues lives – and so pray remains our main tool. The spirit empowered word of God remains our main strength.

So, what has changed?

We no longer work 4-5 days a week in the same office space with the same people we knew back in 2019. As many as 10% of Australia's workforce changed their jobs during COVID. Many

of us no longer share the same in office days as our team members. Many people reported that their friendship groups have shrunk. In short, we just don't see as many people as frequently.

### MANY OF US FEEL LIKE WE'RE STARTING FROM SCRATCH WITH A WHOLE NEW GROUP OF PEOPLE WITH WHOM WE'RE JUST NOT SPENDING AS MUCH TIME AS BEFORE. IT SEEMS JUST MUCH HARDER THAN EVER.

The good news is, people seem more open to relationships – or at least more open to more meaningful relationships. A recent company cultural study revealed that while some have embraced the remote working advantages and don't want to return to working in the office, the rest expressed high desires to form work friendships. Even those satisfied with working exclusively from home were more likely than not to desire good work relationships. One in four workers listed good relationships with colleagues as a significant factor in their job satisfaction – higher than pay!

So with so many of us feeling like we're starting from scratch with people at work, how can we build relationships in post-Covid workplaces?

#### WHERE IS GOD WORKING?

While we usually focus on praying for people in our workplaces, it's worth taking a

prayerful moment to discern how, where, and in whom God might be working around

us. Some workers have found some fruit over Covid in developing relationships with

people they meet outside work: neighbours, gym buddies, old school friends, sport

team friends, choirs, you name it! Is there someone God has brought across your path

that you might have overlooked?

ATTRACTION

C.S. Lewis says "Friendship is born at the moment when one man says to another "What! You Too? I thought that no one but myself..."

We tend to gravitate towards people with whom we share similar outlooks and interests

- this can happen instinctively, but often it can happen by accident. You notice they

have a screensaver with their favourite team, hobby, or vintage airline interest. They

might mention in passing that they sew, hike, or are trying to learn guitar. What are they

listening to on Spotify? What are they watching on Netflix? What are they reading?

These might be 'ins' to start a relationship.

#### HUMILITY AND CURIOUSITY

"Everyone you will ever meet knows something you don't" Bill Bye.

If we start from a starting point of love for others, we develop an essential interest in others – we discover how we can learn from them, and further discover what makes them tick. Good listening to others involves learning how to ask good questions. Use open ended, rather than closed-end (yes/no) questions, learn to utilise the key tools of any good interviewer – 6 words: what, where, how, why, when, and who.

#### **BEAFRIEND**

If we want to form friendships, we start by being a friend. We behave the way we

want others to treat us. Draw people out, get behind them and celebrate them with others.

I remember working with a Canadian man on a project - it was a high pressure

environment with tight deadlines and tensions between teams. This man would visit

each team, at least once a week – hear how things were going for us, talk about how

we were essential for the project, try to understand our pressures, and encouraged

us to keep going. Here's the thing, I don't know if that was a part of his job or not, he

just genuinely expressed care and support for people as he met them. People warm to someone like that.

OPENNESS/VULNERABILITY

Relationships grow out of a mutual respect and trust. It takes time, effort, and resources. If life is full of church and family commitments, it will be hard to develop

friendships at work. Are you open to developing friendships with work colleagues?

Are you willing to show people the real you? Sam Chan points out that you build

relational trust when you ask for favours – when we put ourselves into their debt.

How can you be more vulnerable with work colleagues?

TIME SPENT TALKING AND LISTENING IN A THIRD SPACE

Relationships develop over time – recent research has suggested that close friendship can take 200 hours to grow. And that's not time merely in close proximity to one another. It's time talking and listening – asking good questions. Usually that happens best outside the physical workplace in a third space. It could be the café

down the street, the pub across the road, the work running or cycling group. One

group of workers hired a personal trainer and invited colleagues to join them in a park

at lunchtime so they could develop relationships. Post-Covid many of the clubs and

workplace social structures have stopped, perhaps now is the chance to start some

social opportunities to get to know some colleagues better.

In the post-Covid workplace, we need to be intentional about booking out time with

people. It could be towards a particular project – a community good or charity work. It

could be it's not about achieving anything at all – Thursday night drinks.

What are some ways of spending non-work time with colleagues that you have seen work?

WHERE DO I START?


Have you noticed that you have gravitated towards particular people at work or they

reveal to me the people you would have me share Jesus with in my workplace." Be

warned, God loves to answer that prayer. Are you ready?



# SHARING JESUS POST-COVID **8. DINNER - HURRY UP** AND LISTEN!







In a post-COVID workplace our relational skills may have atrophied, notably our ability to engage in small talk and to listen well to others.

Has there been a time when you really felt listened to?



When we start talking about the deeper things of life, it's time to listen more than we speak.



Everyone should be quick to listen, slow to speak and slow to become angry,

Sin is not ended by multiplying words, but the prudent hold their tongues.

The prudent keep their knowledge to themselves, but a fool's heart blurts out folly.

The one who has knowledge uses words with restraint, and whoever has understanding is even-tempered. <sup>28</sup> Even fools are thought wise if they keep silent, and discerning if they hold their tongues.

Through patience a ruler can be persuaded, and a gentle tongue can break a bone. James 1:19

8. DINNER - HURRY UP AND LISTEN!

# **Key Truths**

When it comes to speaking, the message of Proverbs over and again is - less is more!
Words with restraint, managed with patience can change even the mind of a king! A gentle tongue can break a bone. Imagine what a gentle word could do to a hard heart?
The more we talk, the more there is a chance to sin - the more we listen, the more we are patient, the more we can draw people out and help them see their need for Jesus



When we get to the point of talking about the deeper things of life; morality, values, etc. Our temptation is to start looking for the chink in the armour to prove our friend wrong, or to look for an opening to wedge in the gospel of Jesus. Instead, imagine what would happen if we just listened. Listened not to work out our next argument but listened to understand.

Why does my friend believe this? How does it make sense of the world?

Why is this belief attractive or a comfort?

What is it about this belief that is noble or good?

What might they find hard about Jesus? What might they love about Jesus?

# Introduction

You've been seeking to share Jesus with your friend for some time – you've had coffees and lunches, you've spent time listening and finding out where they're coming from, and you've shared a bit about what the Bible has to say about life. Then, on the way back from a coffee break, you both step into an elevator and she asks, "So, what is it about Jesus that's so important to you?"

What do you say?



There are many different ways to share Jesus in a short space of time:

- You could learn a rote presentation like Two Ways to Live.
- You could talk about why you became a Christian (note, not how)
- You could tell a favourite episode from Jesus' life, or a parable and explain what Jesus is saying about God and us.
- You could pick your favourite verse and explain what it means for you.

Whichever way you go, you want to speak as succinctly as you can, you want to talk about Jesus, and you want to end with a challenge - this has impacts for your friend too! We're going to spend some time picking your favourite passage or verse and seeing how we can best explain Jesus through it.

# SHARING JESUS POST-COVID **10. How we reach the world**







If you were boss of the church, how would you reach the world with the good news of Jesus?



We aim to reach the world through the workplace with the good news of Jesus by prayerfully seeking to see 1000 people across Australia meeting Jesus in the pages of the Bible.



...I am not ashamed of the gospel, because it is the power of God that brings salvation to everyone who believes: first to the Jew, then to the Gentile. Romans 1:16

Consequently, faith comes from hearing the message, and the message is heard through the word about Christ. Romans 10:17

# **Key Truths**

There are many possible ways to reach the world, so why focus on reading the Bible with unbelievers?

Here are 3 reasons:

**Theological:** God works to build his kingdom by his word, through his life-giving Spirit. While God has and does speak in many different ways, he has spoken definitively in his Son, Jesus Christ - the Word of God. As we read the Bible, God's Spirit enlightens our minds and hearts to see Jesus and hear the call of the gospel.

Cultural: Gone is the age where workers trust clergy or theological experts for spiritual

matters. Generation X and Y tend to lok to practitioners and peers for spiritual matters. They want to see whether the Christian life works, but they prefer to listen to people they trust – not the "experts". Further, fewer people now are familiar with the Bible; people start further away than every before – they don't know what they don't know about God. **Relational:** Inviting someone to read a Gospel with us, it's relationally like inviting someone for coffee on a first date, whereas inviting them to church is more like inviting them to come meet all the relatives at a family reunion over the weekend.

Consider evangelist Rico Tice's words:

"Research suggests that when people put their faith in Christ, on average it's taken two years from the point when they came into meaningful contact with a Christian who witnessed to them—and that time period is growing. Witnessing is a long-term commitment to invest in a relationship, to pray tirelessly, and to speak the gospel over and over again, patiently and

persistently. It is a journey of gospel conversations. It really does take effort."

And

"It's harder and harder to take people to hear the Bible taught; you need to take the Bible to

them. People who would never consider stepping into a church will feel far less threatened

reading and talking about the Bible with a friend."


